





#### The Big Picture






Probation is up - suspensions are flat


However, most suspended students never return to UNI

- Suspensions are acting as a deterrent and not as a mechanism to improve

## Who Gets Suspended

Freshman-Juniors get suspended. The Junior bump is related to transfers.

Males are 40% more likely to be suspended than females


- Males make up 41.3% of student population, but 62.2% of suspensions
- There were, on average, 2.3 times as many males suspended during the study period


Bars above 0 mean the population is overrepresented Bars below 0 mean the population is underrepresented

#### Who Gets Suspended

There are differences by college, although the absolute numbers are not that large. CBA has the highest proportion of suspensions, COE the lowest CBA 56


Minority students are more likely to be suspended than white students


 Minority students made up 8.8% of students but 17.5% of suspensions


#### Financial Connection to Suspension

There are significant differences in suspension rates based on proxy measures of financial security

- EFC below \$5000 are 4 times more likely to be suspended than top 4 brackets
  - spike in >\$30k is an artifact of combining classes
- Pell-Eligible students are suspended at a 14% higher rate
- 3 times as many suspended students have U-Bill holds








## High School Performance and Suspension

There is only minor correlation with RAI scores


- RAI =  $(3 \times ACT) + (30 \times GPA) + (5 \times Years of Core Courses)$
- 245 = automatic admission


Some indication that conditional admits are more likely to be suspended, but need different breakdowns



# High School Performance and Suspension

There is a slightly inverse rate of suspension relative to low/high GPA, but strongest for highest GPA





There is a slightly higher suspension rate for 16-20 ACT, but scores do not correlate otherwise
